

What is NARCAN[®] Nasal Spray?

* NARCAN (natoxone HCI) NASAL SPRAY 4mg

- NARCAN[®] Nasal Spray is a single-use device containing a 4 mg dose of naloxone – a substance that attaches to opioid receptors in the brain and nervous system, and temporarily reverses and blocks the effects of opioids.
- NARCAN[®] Nasal Spray is used to treat someone who has, or is suspected to have, overdosed on opioids. NARCAN[®] Nasal Spray can be used by a non-health care professional to reverse the effects of the overdose until medical help arrives.
- Repeat doses may be required. NARCAN[®] Nasal Spray is not a substitute for emergency medical care. Always call 911 before administering NARCAN[®] Nasal Spray.

Identifying opioid poisoning

Check for signs of opioid poisoning, which include:

- Pale and clammy skin
- Extreme drowsiness or passing out
- Not responding to shouting, shaking of shoulders or firmly rubbing middle of chest
- Slowed or no heartbeat
- Pinpoint-sized pupils (the dark centre of the eye)
- Breathing that is very slow, irregular or has stopped. This can lead to cyanosis (changes in the colour of skin, lips, tongue, fingers, and nail beds)


Recognizing cyanosis

Cyanosis may appear differently based on a person's skin tone:

- Patients with lighter skin: as a dark bluish tint to the skin and mucous membranes
- Patients with darker skin: as grey or whitish skin around the mouth, and the conjunctivae (the mucous membrane that covers the front of the eyes) may appear grey or bluish
- Patients with yellow-toned skin: as a greyish-greenish skin tone

NARCAN[®] Nasal Spray is not a substitute for emergency medical care. Always call 911 before administering NARCAN[®] Nasal Spray.




Possible side effects of NARCAN[®] Nasal Spray

- Swelling or dryness in the nose
- Runny or congested nose
- Yawning
- Nervousness
- Pain
- Aggressive behaviours, irritability, restlessness, agitation

- Nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal cramps
- Shivering, chills, tremors, trembling, fever, sweating
- Weakness
- Seizures, shaking, muscle spasms
- Dizziness, headache



NARCAN[®] Nasal Spray does not reverse the effects of an overdose caused by non-opioid drugs.

NARCAN[®] Nasal Spray is unlikely to cause harm, even if opioids are not present.



Do you know which medicines are opioids?

Opioids are a broad group of drugs that work by binding to specific receptors in the brain, spinal cord, and gastrointestinal tract. Opioids include prescription medications like morphine, methadone, fentanyl, oxycodone, and hydromorphone, as well as illegal drugs like heroin.
